All contribute to systemic government inaction. With fossil fuel companies among earth's richest, it is one of civilization's great ironies that those causing greatest harm to earth's environment and future generations are most rewarded financially. Surely responsible energy companies making billions of dollars annually should be leading the urgent transition from polluting fossil fuels to clean renewables? Instead, they seek ever more risky 'unconventional' oil reserves, some, ironically, such as the Arctic, made more accessible by climate change. With NZ's offshore areas also targeted, recent Arctic drilling blunders, and a relentlessly rising sea, do not augur well for the future of our coasts.
