Taranaki is the Sacrifice Zone




Sadly for Taranaki, it's business as usual both on and offshore.

Most of New Zealand's exploration and drilling takes place here in Taranaki.

In 2018, the government is releasing 1,703 sq km of Taranaki land for oil and gas exploration.

Oil and gas the world cannot afford to burn if there's to be any hope of abating catastrophic climate change.



Megabucks Austrian oil and gas company OMV (which has purchased Shell's offshore oil interests) is proceeding full steam ahead.

OMV plans to drill 12 new exploratory/appraisal wells in six licensed areas spanning almost 9,000 sqkm in the Taranaki Basin.

The public has no say in whether these 12 new wells go ahead or not.
